Admission.

Before a student can enter regularly the Freshman Class of Centre College, he must pass a successful examination in the following studies, or their equivalent:—

Latin.

Cæsar's Commentaries; Virgil's *Æneid*, 8 books; Cicero's Orations, and Grammar, including Prosody.

Greek.

Grammar, including Accents and Quantity; Greek Reader, and Xenophon's *Anabasis*.

Mathematics and English.

Arithmetic, Algebra, as far as Quadratics; English Grammar and English Analysis; Geography, Ancient and Modern; History, and Outlines.

Candidates for admission to a higher class must stand an examination on all the studies previously pursued by the class they desire to enter.

Students desiring to pursue special branches are permitted to enter any class for which they are prepared, subject, however, to the direction of the Faculty, in the amount of study required, which shall always be equal to that of the regular student.

In all cases, a student from another college is required to present satisfactory testimonials of his moral character and standing in the college which he last attended.

The studies in this department are all "optional," but, when once selected, can not be abandoned without the consent of the Faculty. The department is under the control of an instructor who has passed ten years in the universities of Europe. The French, German, Italian and Spanish Languages are taught theoretically and practically.

Composition and Declamation.

There are regular Exercises in Composition and Declamation during the entire course.

History of the College.

CENTRE COLLEGE was chartered by the Legislature of Kentucky in 1819. Jeremiah Chamberlin, D. D., the first President, went into office in 1823. In 1824, the Board of Trustees, according to an arrangement with the Presbyterian Synod of Kentucky, procured an act of the Legislature, modifying its charter, so as to secure to the Synod, on its payment of \$20,000 to the funds of the Institution, the right of appointing the Board of Trustees. This condition having, in 1830, been completely fulfilled on the part of the Synod, all the members of the Board have since that period been appointed by the Synod as their terms of office, from time to time, have expired. One-third of the Board are appointed each year.

Dr. Chamberlin resigned his office in 1830, and the Reverend Gideon Blackburn, D. D., succeeded him in 1827, the office having, in the mean time, been temporarily filled by the Rev. David C. Proctor. On the resignation of Dr. Blackburn, in 1830, John C. Young, D. D., was elected. Dr. Young died in office June 23d, 1837, and, on the 9th of August following, Rev. L. W. Green, D. D., was elected his successor, and entered upon his duties January 1st, 1838. Dr. Green died in office May 26th, 1863, and on the 15th of October following, Rev. Wm. L. Breckinridge, D. D., was elected President. He accepted the 29th of the same month, and immediately entered upon the duties of his office. He resigned on the 16th of October, 1868.

The Funds.

The original amount paid by the Synod to obtain the right of appointing the Board was entirely consumed in the buildings, apparatus, library and current expenses, and in 1830 the College was wholly destitute of means. Since that period funds have been contributed by the liberality of various individuals, which, as invested by the Board in stocks of various kinds, and notes, form an endowment equivalent to about \$165,000. The Synod, at its meeting in Lebanon, 1858, authorized the Board of Trustees to make application to the churches for the sum of \$50,000, to be appropriated to the erection of additional College buildings, and for other purposes needful for the full equipment of the College. This fund was subscribed by the friends of the College within the limits of the Synod of Kentucky. A large part of it has been paid, and a handsome and commodious edifice has been erected.

The Library Building, through the liberality of D. A. Sayre, has been completed and is now in use.

Religious Instruction and Discipline.

The recitations of each day are opened with the worship of God, in the Chapel, and religious instruction is given, through the study of the Holy Scriptures, to all classes, on Monday of each week, instead of one of the ordinary recitations. These services, together with the public preaching of the Gospel, all the students are expected to attend—unless specially excused from any of them.

Boarding.

The students do not board and lodge together, but in private families, in which they enjoy the advantages of Christian society, and are thus preserved from many temptations. No fixed rate of boarding can be stated, as the price varies with the cost of provisions, fuel, etc. During the current year the prevailing rates were from \$4 to \$5. This includes room, furniture, and fuel.

At their last meeting, the Board of Trustees ordered a number of rooms to be fitted up in Centre Hall for the use of students. The order is being executed, and by the opening of next session these rooms will be ready for occupation. By lodging in Centre Hall (with a trifling room-rent) and clubbing, the above rates may be considerably reduced.

Tuition and other Fees.

Tuition is \$45 per annum, and must be paid semi-annually in advance. Those who enter two months after the session has commenced are charged in proportion to that part of it that may remain.

Young men of limited means, preparing to preach the Gospel, when suitably recommended, pay no tuition fee. The sons of all Presbyterian ministers are received without charge for tuition.

The same privilege is now extended to the sons of ministers of every denomination, and to all young men of limited means and good character. No one will be excluded because he may be unable to pay the ordinary charge for instruction, but every one will be welcome to all the privileges of the College without his incurring pecuniary obligation. The question of future compensation will be left optional with each one.

A contingent fee of \$5 annually, for janitor's hire, fuel in College rooms, etc., is required of all.

Donations to Museum and Prize Fund.

During the last year, through the munificent liberality of Dr. Jas. W. Scott, of Lexington, Ky., a complete set of Ward's casts, for illustrating zoology, and a large number of minerals have been added to the College Museum.

Some two years since, the late Gen'l J. T. Boyle, of Louisville, donated one thousand dollars, the yearly proceeds of which were to constitute the Henry Barrett Boyle Prize. This prize will be awarded this year and regularly hereafter to the best Latin scholar of the Sophomore Class.

Examinations.

There are two public examinations of all the classes—one in the middle of the College year and another at the close—held before a committee of the Synod and conducted by each professor in his own department. These examinations are either oral or written, or both combined, and are designed to test thoroughly each student's knowledge of the studies of the session.

The final examination of the graduating class is held four weeks before the close of the session.

Literary Societies—Libraries.

There are two Literary Societies connected with the College. They hold public exercises on the 23d of February, and on the Wednesday preceding Commencement, each year. The number of volumes in their libraries amounts to about 4,500. The College Library contains over 2,000 volumes.

Commencement—Vacations.

The session opens on the first Monday of September, and continues, with a recess during the Christmas Holidays, until the last Thursday of June, on which day the Annual Commencement is held.

The Master's Degree.

The degree of A. M. is conferred in course on every graduate of three years' standing, who, in the interval, shall have sustained a good moral character, and pursued professional or other studies, and who shall make application for the degree at least one day previous to the Annual Commencement.

Location of the College.

The College is located in Danville in the center of the State.

This town, which is also the seat of the Danville Theological Seminary of the Presbyterian Church, of the State Institution for the Education of the Deaf and Dumb, and of a flourishing Female School, is easily reached by public conveyances, as well as by private travel, from every part of the country.

Preparatory Department.

This Department has been organized by the Board of Trustees of Centre College, and is under the immediate control of Teachers appointed by the Board, and under the general superintendence of the Faculty of the College.

And while the course of instruction is especially adapted to prepare young men for the Freshman Class, it is intended at the same time to furnish a liberal English education to any who may desire it. Any student in either department is entitled, without additional charge, to all the privileges of the other.

Tuition in the Preparatory Department is \$30 per annum, payable semi-annually, with \$5 extra for servant's hire, fuel, &c.

Alumni Association.

The annual meeting of the Alumni Association of Centra College is held immediately after the close of the Commencement exercises.
