DICK: This will acknowledge receipt of your letter recording telegrams exchanged between you and Mr. Bible. I am sorry Mr. Bible is not available. The present situation seems to be growing more and more restricted toward McMillin. A letter from Myers received this morning records the fact that the Centenary Board of Trustees met on the 20th and voted not to release him. He is not, therefore, available for coaching in 1924. Bo wants to know of Myers if we want him to begin December 1. 1924. He says that a banquet will be served at Centenary Monday night, February 25th, at which time the Centenary people want him to enter into a new contract covering a period of five years. Myers has asked him to hold off and not to sign up the contract, first of all because he proceeds on the presumption that we want him, and second because Bo wants to come to Centre. The local Committee feel that the expression is practically unanimous in desiring Bo to begin here in December 1924, and I have no doubt but what they will negotiate with Bo to begin at that time. Myers has offered his services to coach the team this fall, an arrangement that I think will be perfectly feasible, and probably as good an arrangment as we can make as he is in intimate touch with the boys and has had their confidence.
