The National Motto for the Y. W. C. A., is, "I came that they may have life, and may have it abundantly." The membership in the United States is 253,406. The only way we can make this Association worthy of its name is by the help of all the girls. For the Association may be considered as one body in Christ, the girls are the different members of this body. MEMBERSHIPS

The Active Memberships of the Association consists of students who are members of Protestant Churches and are over fifteen years of age.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

Kentucky College for Women has the distriction of being the only college in the State in which there is a Sunday School carried on by the students. The teachers are girls chosen from the student body as are the officers. Every student in college is enrolled and the attendance is unsually regular. The teachers have a teachers' training class which meets each Saturday, and the lesson for the following Sunday is taught by the Bible

The Sunday School is of vital importance to each girl. It is alive and doing good work in the keeping of Kentucky College standards.

MISSION STUDY

The school has been controlled for two years by the Honor System. This system consists of two phases; the Honor Roll and the Honor Board. Girls may become members of the Honor Roll by signing a pledge which puts them on their honor in all phases of school life. The conduct and standing in classes determines whether she remains on the Honor Roll or not. The Honor Board which controls the school, consists of ten members: Mrs. Acheson, the chairman, four faculty members appointed by the president. and five Honor Board girls nominated by the faculty and elected by the Honor Roll girls.

ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

All new girls should join the Association. Every well rounded girl should have an interest in the Athletics as well as other phases of college life. Many different kinds of athletic sports are offered to the students. A modern gymnasium building has recently been built which contains a swimming pool, bowling alley, track and large basket ball floor. There are three good tennis courts on the campus kept in condition by the Association and for the use of the Association

The basket ball season bgins about the last of November. The contending parties are the Cherokees composed of the girls in the odd classes, 1915 and 1917; and the Wahpanooches, the even classes, 1916 and 1918. The Cherokee colors are yellow and black. The Wahps, red and blue. Every new girl should identify herself with the side to which her class belongs and either go out and try for the team, or wear her colors and "root" at the time of the game. The two teams are now contending for a shield. Each year the winning team is the one which wins two games out of three. In 1913 the Cherokees won; the Wahps won in 1914; so next year decides the winner of the shield.

Any one may join the association by giving her name to the secretary of the association and the first meeting in the secretary of the association and the secretary of the new year are elected. They are chosen by the girls from the student body. At this meeting an executive committee is appointed, composed of the four new officers, Mrs. Acheson and the gymnasium teacher.

This committee takes charge of the funds of the association and conducts its business.

4. Girls are allowed to go calling

5. The shopping line goes to town once each week. The second and third floor lines take alternate weeks to shop, A special shopping line goes once each week. Things that are to be fitted must be brought at this time. One must put in a request to go in this line.

6. The entertainment of visitors is a privilege granted to members of the household, when it is convenient to

the management.

7. Each girl may spend two Saturdays of each month in town with friends. The invitation must come 16

through the office. No pupil may spend the night away from the college except under the chaperonage of parent or guardian.
