APPARATUS.

The Institute is furnished with a superior Church Organ, and the best seven octave Piano Forte, Guitars and a double action Harp have also been provided. A good Chemical and Philosophical Apparatus belongs to the School, and classes have the benefit of experiments.

MODE OF STUDY.

A definite and comprehensive course of study is laid down in the classes, beginning at the foundation of education—Reading and Spelling—are led on carefully and thoroughly, each pupil being advanced as the various branches are fully understood.

It is the aim of all who teach in this Institution to train the mind of the pupil to patient and independent thought, to generalise and condense; one of the most difficult, yet useful of lessons.

Mathematics and the Languages are specially valued for mental discipline.

CLASSIFICATION.

Real attainments constitute the basis of classification. Promotion to the higher classes will depend entirely on scholarship and not on the length of time the pupil may have attended this or some other Institution. Three years are necessary for the completion of the Scientific Course and four for the Classical.

A daily record is kept of the attendance, scholarship and deportment of each pupil.

DIPLOMAS.

Those who pass satisfactory examinations in the full course of English Studies with one of the Ancient or Modern Languages,

and are proficient in Harp, Piano, or Guitar Music, will be entitled to a diploma, the highest honor a Literary Institution can confer.

Qualification is made the sole basis of graduation and not the mere fact of having completed a course of study; but pupils receiving Diplomas must be members of the school at least one year.

GOVERNMENT.

The government of the school will be kind and parental, but decided. We aim to secure strict obedience to rules, from a principle of love, rather than of fear. Ladylike conduct is required of every pupil of *all* sexes. Industry, order, neatness, punctuality, courtesy, good temper and propriety of language and deportment, are carefully enjoined as essential elements of the true woman.

Strict discipline and uninterrupted application are indispensable for the attainment of good scholarship, and this discipline must be maintained. Parents and guardians are therefore requested not to listen to the solicitations of their daughters and wards for permission to return home during the session, or to leave school before the actual close.

DRESS.

Neatness and simplicity of dress are enjoined upon all; but extravagance in this particular is strictly prohibited; and patrons are particularly requested not to supply their daughters and wards with expensive apparel.

PARENT MONEY. INDIVIDUAL EXPENSES, &c.

Parents and guardians are especially desired not to furnish their daughters and wards with much money. To defray the expenses of necessary clothing, mantua-making, books, stationery, &c. a deposit must be made with the Principal sufficient to meet the demand.

SWEETMEATS, &c.

The Principal earnestly desires, that no boxes of edibles be sent to the pupils boarding in the Institute, as this practice has proved a fruitful source of evil.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION.

Particular attention will be paid to the health of the pupils and the most vigilant care exercised over them in this respect.

A *connection* pleasure coach has been provided, without extra charge to convey boarders to and from town and church, and also for recreation and pleasure, on Saturday, in the surrounding country.

SICKNESS.

Special provision has been made for those who may be sick. In case a pupil is sufficiently sick to need the attention of a physician, the Principal will communicate the same promptly to the parent or guardian; and should the patient desire it, she can retire from the apartment she usually occupies, to a room fitted up expressly for the sick, where she can have perfect quiet and repose; and no danger to the remainder of the household need be apprehended in case of contagious disease.

MORAL AND SOCIAL INFLUENCES.

Students from abroad, except those living in the families of guardians, or near relatives will hereafter be required to board in the Institute, with the Principal and his Associates. A well regulated household, comprising representatives from the best families in different sections of the country, must form a valuable school for moral, intellectual and social culture, and constitute a circle in which are found all the attractions and safeguards of a desirable and happy home. Careful attention is paid to the study of the Bible; and the aim of the Sabbath School established in the Institute, is to impress mind and heart with religious truth, without sectarian influences. A weekly prayer-meeting is held by the pupils on Saturday evening.

BUILDINGS AND ACCOMMODATIONS.

The Buildings have been constructed solely for educational and household purposes, and with special reference to health, convenience and comfort. They are heated with steam, lighted with gas, and supplied throughout with water from five large cisterns. Hot water and cold, is conveyed into all the private rooms, and ample provision has been made for ventilation and bathing. Only two occupants to a room, and each pupil is provided with a neat and commodious single bed. It has been the aim of the Proprietor to furnish the apartments, in such a manner as to refine the taste, and make them attractive and homelike.

The Chapel, or Study Hall, eighty feet long, fifty wide, and twenty feet high, is furnished with the latest and most approved style of school chairs and single desks, so corresponding to each other as to render the position of the pupil both easy and healthful. It has in connection six recitation rooms.

TERMS.

For Boarders, \$150, must be paid at the beginning of the school year, together with a deposit for current expenses; the balance for Board, Tuition, &c. the 1st of February. For Day Scholars, one-half the tuition is required at the beginning of the session, the balance the 1st of February.

CALENDAR.

The school year commences on the first Monday in September, and closes the last of June, with an intervening vacation, except the customary holidays in December. The annual vacation embraces the months of July and August. Pupils who desire it can remain at the Institute during the vacation, by paying \$25 each extra. A public Review of classes is held near the close of January, and a general Examination the last of June, followed by graduating exercises.

Application for admission should be made as early as possible.

LOCATION.

The Institute buildings are situated on the south side of Lexington Street, about one-fourth of a mile east of town. The grounds embracing some seven acres. In healthfulness of climate,

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and beauty of scenery, Danville can hardly be surpassed; and to these natural advantages appended those of its various and popular Institutions of Learning, which, with the intelligence, refinement and hospitality of its citizens, combine to render it a most desirable educational home for both the sons and daughters of our land. It is readily accessible from the South and West by the Lebanon branch of the Louisville and Nashville Railroad, and from the North and East by the Kentucky Central Railroad. Crick Orchard Springs, a delightful summer resort, so well known throughout the South for the various and sensitive qualities of their mineral waters, are but twenty miles from Danville, and a good turnpike brings them into daily and pleasant communication with this place by stage.

SCHOOL RULES.

Young Ladies are required to be punctual at school and in their seats, when the silence-bell rings, at half-past eight.

To refrain from every form of conversation during study hours.

To keep books clean, and contents of desks neatly arranged.

To be prompt in going to and returning from a recitation room.

To deposit in desks all books, slates, pencils, pens, &c. before dismissal.

To leave school quietly as soon as excused.

To study closely and attentively at home.

To be prepared for every school exercise at the appointed time.

To abstain from visiting music and recitation rooms, without permission.

To remain on the grounds during the half-hour for recess.

Music pupils to practice their lessons constantly, during the full time assigned for that purpose, and to use places at no other time.

Every young lady is required to conduct at all times in a quiet and lady-like manner, and to promote, as far as possible, the comfort, happiness, and improvement of others.

FAMILY RULES AND REGULATIONS.

ARTICLE 1st. Every pupil boarding at the Institute is expected to deport herself with that degree of complaisance that marks the conduct of the true lady.

2nd. Each pupil is required to furnish the Matron with a complete list of all the articles comprising her wardrobe, on entering the Institution as a boarder.

3rd. Every article of clothing must be plainly marked, and put in its proper place.

4th. Each boarder must provide her own towels and table napkins.

5th. No pupil is allowed to open accounts at any of the stores in town, nor to visit town for the purpose of shopping but once per month, and then she must be accompanied by the Matron or a Teacher.

6th. Articles to be washed must be put into a bag made for the purpose, with the number of pieces and the owner's name labeled thereon.

7th. Every article for personal use must be put away neatly in its proper place, and all trunks, wardrobes, and bureau drawers locked, before the occupant leaves the room for the Study Hall.

8th. Young ladies are particularly requested to exercise care in the use of all the furniture in their rooms. For any abuse of furniture, an extra charge will be made.

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93. No sweetmeats, cake, effectionary, nor any articles of food whatever, to be kept by young ladies in their rooms.

103. Ink is not to be carried from the Chapel to any apartment.

110. Borrowing or wearing articles of clothing or jewelry, belonging to another, is not allowed.

120. Visiting rooms limited to Saturday afternoons.

125. Young ladies are required to be uniformly punctual at prayers and at table.

144. Pianos are not to be used for practice later than 8 o'clock at night, and pupils are requested to close the same when they leave them.

146. Preparations for retiring to be commenced at the ringing of the first bell, and the gas to be turned off when the last bell rings.

164. Every young lady is expected to be careful in the observance of etiquette at table.

174. No young lady will be permitted to answer the door-bell nor to go to the parlor, library, reception-room, dining-room, or kitchen without permission.

180. The Principal will feel obliged to boarders for any information pertaining to inattention, or neglect of duty on the part of servants.

190. All letter writing restricted to Friday and Saturday; and the correspondence of pupils, except with parents, must pass through the hands of the Principals. The conveying of letters, notes, or cards, to or from boarders, by day-scholars or others, without the knowledge of the Principal, is forbidden.

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20th. Visits of pupils in private families in town, under ordinary circumstances, will not be allowed.

21st. Attending parties, at any time during the school year, December holidays not excepted, is considered a serious evil, and consequently forbidden.

22d. Receiving company, except in case of special and written request of parent or guardian, and with the consent of the Principal is not allowed.

23d. Young ladies boarding in the Institute are expected to attend church regularly, and with the Principal, except at the express wish of parent or guardian to the contrary; in which cases, they are accompanied by a teacher to other churches.

24th. Young ladies are required to exercise on the grounds, or out of doors every morning and evening.

25th. Boarding pupils are not allowed to leave the Institute grounds, without permission from the Principal.

26th. Every pupil boarding in the Institute is expected to yield a cheerful compliance with the above specified rules and regulations.
