## CALDWELL FEMALE COLLEGE.

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The object of this College, located at Danville, Ky., is the higher education of women. It appeals to the common sense and growing conviction that our daughters have as deep an interest in accurate and extensive knowledge as our sons. It will constantly seek, therefore, to supply to its students the means of the broadest literary and scientific culture, believing that whatever mental discipline is regarded as needful to the usefulness and happiness of men, is to the same extent and for the same reasons equally needful to women.

Danville has long been noted for its educational advantages, its healthful location, and the refinement, intelligence and morality of its people. It is accessible by the Cincinnati Southern R. R. and the Lebanon Branch of the Louisville & Nashville R. R. Besides these there are eight macadamized roads entering the city.

### *The College Building*

Is situated on Lexington Avenue, newly opposite the grounds where the old building was burned. The house is commodious, cheerful and attractive—built of brick, with three stories above a basement.

The apartments were newly fitted up last year and are well ventilated and pleasant. The grounds embrace six acres, and are eminently eligible on account of being healthful and freedom from all surroundings prejudicial to a female school. A more delightful location could scarcely have been found. The large yard in front, shaded by tall forest trees, invites pleasant recreation to students, and is a very attractive feature of the grounds.

We offer ourselves to the parents of Kentucky and surrounding States to help them to educate their daughters; for to them, primarily, is committed this holy work,—and with their patronage and co-operation we are sure to attain the great end in view.

*Special Points.*

1st. To train the mind for independent thought and to instruct thoroughly.

2d. To teach self-government, which is the basis of good conduct.

3d. To require lady-like deportment of every pupil at all times.

4th. To train to habitual neatness—both in person and surroundings.

5th. To guard the health of boarders by protecting them from exposure, supplying them with wholesome food, and requiring judicious exercise in pure air.

Our Collegiate Course of Study has been selected with great care, embracing those branches which are essential to develop thought, train the mind, and prepare young ladies for any position in life, and covers as many branches as young ladies of good talent can master in four years.

Being deeply impressed with the importance of laying a good foundation if we would build a beautiful and enduring superstructure, we give special attention to Preparatory and Primary works. As these departments ordinarily receive but little attention in schools of the highest order of learning, we earnestly invite attention to the prominence we give them. And when scholars that have begun their education in our Primary Department shall have completed the whole course we are sure that parents and friends will be delighted with their training.

*Education.*

Both theoretical and practical—to the end of making good teachers—is a part of the regular course.

*Calisthenics and Gymnastics*

Have their proper place for exercise and physical development.

*Music and Other Extra Branches.*

In this Department we have the very best facilities for giving instruction on the Piano, Guitar and Organ. Also Vocal Culture and practice in Chorus Singing, and every effort will be made to make pupils thorough in this divine art.

In Greek, Modern Languages, Drawing and Painting—in Oil and Water Colors—we offer first-class teachers.

*Examinations.*

We have three written examinations each term, and by the per cent in these and the daily recitations the scholarship of each pupil is designated. In these frequent examinations pupils are able to find their own deficiency in time to bring it up and thus avoid falling behind their class at the end of the term.

*Reports.*

A report, showing the standing of his daughter, in Department, Attendance, Diligence and Scholarship, will be sent to each parent and guardian after every examination.

*Absence.*

Parents are particularly requested to guard against allowing their daughters—either for seemingly great or small matters—to remain out of school, as much valuable time is thus lost, and it always distracts from their interest in their studies. In short, absence is so detrimental that it can not be allowed without written authority from parents or guardians. And no deduction is made for absence, except in cases of illness protracted one month or more.

*Government.*

Our government is gentle, but firm—such as does not destroy the self-respect of the pupil while excellent order is preserved. To our success in this important point we invite attention.

*Religious.*

The school is opened daily with devotional exercises in the Chapel, consisting of reading the Scriptures, singing, prayer, and, sometimes, a brief exposition and application of the truths read.

All the pupils boarding in the College are expected to attend church, with the President, at least once every Sabbath, unless sick; or, under proper care, they may attend any other church designed by parents or guardians.

Every Sabbath afternoon all the boarders meet with the President and teachers and spend one hour in the study of the Bible. Bible History and Geography will be a regular study.

*Boarding.*

Pupils from a distance ought to board in the Institution. An

**RESTRAINTS**—(1.) Systematic hours for study and recreation, and protection against interruption by company and many other things common to private families. (2.) Regular attendance in all kinds of weather, without exposure. (3.) The watchful care and counsel of the lady teachers in all the details of general deportment and social etiquette.

### *Cut-fit.*

Each boarder must bring a bible, a dictionary, an umbrella, or gossamer waterproof, a pair of thick shoes and sandals for walking, napkins, cuspidor ring, towels and other necessary toilet articles. Every article should be distinctly and indelibly marked with the owner's name in full. No arbitrary law of dress is adopted, but neatness, good taste and economy are recommended.

### *Visitors.*

Parents and other friends are invited and always welcome to the class rooms and other exercises of the College. Strangers calling upon young ladies will please bring letters of introduction to the President from their parent or guardian. Saturday afternoons from 1 to 5 o'clock are set apart to receive those permitted to call upon them.

### *Correspondence.*

Young ladies desiring to write to persons outside their immediate families must bring a list of such names to the President from their parent or guardian.

### *Pocket Money.*

Parents furnishing their daughters with any considerable amount of money should deposit it with the President or other suitable person. This will be a security against pilfering, which sometimes occurs in such establishments, and will also be a check to extravagance. But we earnestly request that pupils be not furnished with unnecessary spending money, as it encourages habits of extravagance which we desire to discourage.

*Special Notices.*

(1.) It is very important that pupils be in the College on the opening day of each term—that they may be ready to start with their classes—and because no deduction will be made for any delay in entering during the first month of each term.

(2.) Early application for board will secure choice of rooms, but no room can be kept for absence, unless all charges for the term have been paid.

(3.) When a pupil is matriculated she is bound for the term a full price—unless by special agreement, and such agreement will be broken by the patron if payment is not made in strict accordance with the specified terms.

(4.) Payment for board, tuition, &c., is due and must be made as soon as a scholar is matriculated. This is absolutely necessary to the success of the school, and is, we are fully persuaded, best for both parties.

(5.) A pupil admitted on any condition will be charged for not less than one month.
